Combined score of two internal tests, two quizzes and assignments/seminars is sent to the University (these marks have 50 credit in a student's final Score). The passing marks (combined score in the internal assessment) is the criteria to appear in final University exams. Evaluation of answer sheets of internal examination is completed within one week from the date of examination and marks of individual subjects are displayed within the following two weeks. A minimum of 75 attendance in each course separately has to be necessarily obtained by the students to appear for the final examinations.
