- Acquire knowledge regarding various components of a research project such as acknowledgement, objectives and methods of study, chapterization, references and bibliography

## M.A. SEMESTER III (ENGLISH PHONETICS AND LINGUISTICS)

After completion of the course, students shall be able to

- Identify and explain various terms related to phonetics such as phonemes, allophones, vowels, consonants, syllable, rhythm, intonation
- Gain knowledge about three systems of speech, organs of speech
- Classify and describe speech sounds of English
- Explain Chomsky's Transformational Generative Grammar and Halliday's Systemic Linguistics

- Define and distinguish various concepts of linguistics such as synchrony and diachrony, syntagmatic and paradigmatic, signifier and signified, and competence and performance
- Describe the characteristics of language
- Explain the various variations of language like pidgin, creole, diglossia, register, dialect, slang, jargon

# M.A. SEMESTER III (ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING AND ENGLISH IN INDIA)

After completion of the course, students shall be able to

- Explain various techniques and principles of language teaching such as Grammar Translation Method, Direct Method, Audio-Lingual Method, Communicative Language Teaching, Content based instructions, Task based teaching
- Gain knowledge about the characteristics and merits and demerits/limitations of various types of syllabus such as grammatical syllabus, functional syllabus, notional syllabus, procedural syllabus, task-based syllabus and content syllabus
- Describe the features of Macaulay's minutes, Wood's Despatch, Calcutta University Commission, Curriculum Development Center and also analyze their features
- Gain knowledge about English boom in India, English as a global language and teaching of English in Post Independent India
